


- Read daily for 15 minutes and reading records signed by a parent/carer.

Reading at home

- Books will be changed on a Monday and Thursday – however children must bring their reading books and reading record in every day

Your child will bring home 2 books at a time to read and share with you.

Please try and hear your child read <u>everyday</u> or <u>at least</u> four times a week.

Every time you hear your child read please sign in the reading diary.

It is vital that their reading books and reading diary are in school **everyday!** The day we hear them read or change their book may change and we can not do that if they do not have them in school.

You do not have to finish a whole book everyday, read a few pages and ask them questions. Lots of children can read the words but do not understand what they mean.

Certificates will be issued every half term for the best home readers! Get reading!






Seesaw


Creating Excellent Learners



- CEL (Creating Excellent Learners) is an approach to helping children to become better learners, both in and out of Abbey View.
- It is about creating a culture in classrooms that cultivates learning habits and attitudes that enable children to face difficulty and uncertainty, calmly, confidently and creatively.
- This is not an approach that is additional to teaching; it is an integral part of it, embedded in everything we do at Abbey View Primary Academy.



What are the 5Rs?



- The children learn about the 5 Rs; Resilience, Resourcefulness, Reflectiveness, Relationships and Risk Taking.
- We explain that these are like a group of 'learning muscles'. Just as we can build our physical muscles with the right kind of exercise, learning muscles can also be developed and can grow in strength and stamina.
- Within each of the 5 Rs are certain key "capacities" or skills which we help the children develop.





Resilience means that we are learning to persevere; even if our work is difficult we do not give up! We might remind ourselves of positive thoughts, such as:


- I can do this if I really put my mind to it?
- What can I do to manage my distraction?



RISK-TAKING:

We are learning to take risks. This means I won't be afraid to learn in a different way and try new things. Learning is something that can make us feel a little nervous but I might ask myself questions such as:

- "What if...?"
- "What shall I try now?"





Creating Excellent Learners at AVPA!



RESOURCEFULNESS:

Resourcefulness means that we are learning that lots of things in our classroom can help us learn. If we can use a spelling mat, dictionary or a number line we might not need to ask for a lot help from our adults.



REFLECTIVENESS:

Reflectiveness means that we learn how to slow down and think about our work. We might ask ourselves questions, such as:

- What might I do differently to improve this?
- What can I learn from my mistakes?




RELATIONSHIPS:

We are learning to build our relationships, so we are learning to collaborate with our friends. Sometimes working together is the best way to learn: we can share ideas with our friends and work together to achieve a goal! I might ask myself:

- Who do I work well with?
- · Have I got something to say that



How can you help?



- Encourage your child to use the 5 R's at home.
- Encourage your child to look at the CEL page in their homework diary when completing their homework.
- Use the language of the 5R's at home with your child.



Medical


Attendance

- Attendance is crucial in order to avoid loss of learning







- We are collecting toys and games for our wet play box






